
Walking in Slovenia

CBC/BBC Members Conquer Mt Vogel, Slovenia

On 11 September the group ascended Mt Vogel (1922m), Slovenia, led by Janet. There were exceptional views and wonderful weather all day as the intrepid walkers covered approximately 10.5 kms up the hill over scree slopes and along old mule-style tracks. With over 700 m of ascent it meant we'd all earned the ice cream we finished the day off with.

Vogel is a ski resort in the Julian Alps and we were able to make good use of the cable car to the start of the walk. It was sometimes testing over the last 200 m or so of the climb, requiring our rock scrambling skills, deft footing and being happy with the use of steel cables (via ferrata style) to get up the tricky spots on the ridge. If the mist had cleared, we would apparently have had views to Italy!

The Bohinj Cow Festival, Ribcev Laz, Slovenia

On the group's last day in Ribcev Laz, after having already done 8 hikes, we decided to go to the annual Bohinj Cow Festival. 

Conquering Vršič Pass

Another memorable hike for the combined CBC/BBC crew was the hike to Vršič Pass. It was a beautiful sunny day walking in leafy forests, over gently rippling creeks. We easily forded the Pisniča River and its wide stony bed then explored the WW1 chapel built in memory of the 300 Russian prisoners and 7 Austrian guards killed by an avalanche during the building of the road. There were stunning views at the top of the pass with two unique highlights - the natural 'window' through the limestone at Prisank and the 'crying/sad face' appearing on the Prisank mountain side. All up the group walked 23 kms with a 900 m ascent over fairly easy terrain.




