Once selected, a PDF document will open. It is recommended that you use your browser (Firefox, Microsoft Edge, Chrome, etc) to get the smoothest viewing experience, although any PDF reader will do.

Warning—there are 101 pages in the document. If you want to print something; it is suggested that you copy and paste it somewhere before printing, otherwise you might waste a lot of paper and ink.

Leaders with additional walk descriptions they'd like to have included should send them to **Walks Register Updates**.

Some walks require permission from landholders and the Walks Officer retains a list of their contact details. Just to make sure his list is up to date, leaders are requested to confirm the information with him by email to <u>Walks</u> <u>Officer</u>. In the next update, the Register will show which walks are in this category.

Easy Wednesday Walks. Simply because there isn't much need for most of these to be graded and to include detailed descriptions, there is little information on them in the Walks Register. However, if you'd like them added, please do send the details to the email address mentioned above and they'll be included.

New Sections of the AAWT



The small bridges on the AAWT between Honeysuckle Campground and the Booroomba Rocks car park were destroyed in the fires. Someone decided this would be a good opportunity to re-route the track in places and remove the need for bridges.

It hasn't worked, as the photo above demonstrates. Walkers are trying to build their own crossings with whatever is at hand, but not doing a very good job of it. In some places the newer sections of track are now 3 metres wide as a result of walkers trying to avoid the mud.

There have also been a lot of falls, including a bad one by our Walks Officer who impaled himself on a blackened stump and ended up needing surgery.

Let's hope sanity prevails and replacement bridges are installed on this most popular section of the AAWT.


It's Slippery Everywhere

The History of Contour Lines


Understanding how to read a map when you're in the mountains has a lot to do with contour lines.

Here's a bit of history for you. In 1774, a Scottish mountain called Schiehallion was the subject of a groundbreaking experiment to determine the mass of the Earth by Astronomer Royal, Nevil Maskelyne. This was due to its almost symmetrical shape and isolation.


The experiment was based around the hypothesis that Schiehallion's known mass would have an observable gravitational attraction on objects and that this phenomenon could be measured. The data was then used, incredibly, to calculate the mass of the Earth for the first time. The calculation, although not perfect, was pretty accurate.


Maskelyne gave the task of calculating Schiehallion's mass to a man named **Charles Hutton**. Hutton did this by triangulating its height at various points across the mountain's area and joining the dots. The result of this study was the birth of contour lines.
