PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2022-2023

In addition to the normal administrative activities of the Committee, the Committee members focussed on two matters of significant importance for the club, being a substantial revision of the club's constitution and documenting the rationale and process associated with Honorary (Life) Membership submissions.

The review of the Clubs constitution was necessary to ensure alignment with and ensuring that our obligation to comply with necessary due processes for associations were met. The constitution changes are a major point for discussion at this AGM. The rationale and process associated with Honorary (Life) Membership submissions has been recently published on our website.

During the year the Committee also provided inputs to the ACT Government sponsored "Namadgi Walking Trail" study, where we put forward our views on limiting any developments to help protect the environment as well as suggestions for upgrades to tracks and facilities in support of all bushwalkers, whether they be casual or more serious hikers.

The reports from other Committee members will provide details about club activities and material(s).

In quick summary though, I would like to highlight that:

- Our membership numbers remain steady with new members bolstering our numbers.
- Our financial position remains sound.
- In addition to our many walking program activities, the social events continue to be a great success and very well attended.
- Our annual first aid course and annual navigation skills and walk leaders' development activity was well attended, the latter assisting in the development of new walk leaders.
- Our website continued to be enhanced with additional content and links to other sites
 of interest to bushwalkers, and
- Our monthly newsletter and Facebook pages were also very well received.

Whilst we had a small number of (injury) incidents on walks, our walk leaders and other walk participants handled these situations very well, the Committee decided to provide additional education and guidance to all of our members via newsletter articles during the year on how to handle and report such events.

I would like to thank all of our Committee members for their great contributions during the year and thank Prue Deacon and David Wardle for their contribution to the club both as active members but also in numerous Committee roles over many years. They have decided to not continue in Committee roles thereby freeing up time to spend with family as well as for themselves. I am sure that they will remain active participants in club activities, but as participants rather than leaders.

I apologise for not attending this AGM, as Deborah and I will be hiking in Europe, but I am very confident that Prue Deacon, our Vice-president will chair the meeting exceptionally well.

WALKS OFFICER'S REPORT 2022-23

It has been another successful activity year for the Brindabella Bushwalking Club. While there has been a significant increase in member participation in Club activities, there has been a marked change in the way that members have attended our various walks. All walks on a Wednesday have seen a strong increase whereas the weekend walks have suffered a drop. Members spoken with about this are just saying that their weekends are busier with family and other activities whereas mid weeks are easier to quarantine for walking. The bounce back from COVID restrictions will be another reason for the overall increase.

The Easy half day Wednesday Walks are a star activity with 744 attendees all enjoying the social and physical activity. The inclusion of these walks every week has certainly proven well worthwhile.

Our Walks Program has continued with a great mix of walks within the ACT, surrounding NSW and away trips. The trips away have included the Wharf to Wharf, Cockatoo Island, the Royal National Park, Tumut, the Victorian High country, Three Mile Dam, the Sunshine Coast, Lamington National Park, the Grampians Peak Trail, Perisher, an ascent of Bimberi and at last the long postponed trip to New Zealand. A note here that some trip leaders have filled in one Walks Report for the whole trip while other leaders have provided a Walks Report for each walk of the time away. This means that the walks on trips away are significantly underreported. This need for consistency can be addressed next year.

They all continue to amaze with offering both new and regular favourite walks for each Program. Our team of regular leaders have been joined by some equally enthusiastic new leaders who provide a new take on familiar and new walks.

Walks Sub-Committee: The members of this Committee spent a lot of time during the year working with our walks leaders and organising their walks into the Walks Program. In the Program for the current six month period we continue to provide a great range of walks at all of the various walking levels.

Easy/Medium Wednesday Walks: Kathy Handel Medium/Hard Wednesday Walks: Peter Wellman

I would also like to acknowledge Jillian Bellamy who has served on this Committee for many years and has now stepped back as other priorities have demanded her time.

Emergency Officers: I would also like to thank our two Emergency Officers, Doug Finlayson and Col Boreham who have always been just a phone call away if required. Doug and Col have served in this role for many a year for which the Committee is extremely grateful. Now is the time for a change and who better for this role than the past two Walks Officers? I thank John Ellis who will join me in the role as the new Emergency Officers.

Program: The Committee has recommended that we cease printing and posting the Walks Program from the current issue. The majority of our members now receive the Program in digital form as do those participating in our various Wednesday Walks and Social Programs. If there is any member who is unable to access the Program in this format they could let a Committee member know and we will attempt to make alternate arrangements for them.

We look forward to another year with an active Walks Program and with much to enjoy for our members.

TREASURER'S REPORT 2022-23

The BBC started the financial year with \$19,159.60 and finished with \$20,537.97. Our surplus for the year was \$1,378.37.

The income is derived from membership subscriptions and a (very) little interest on monies held in the bank. The subscriptions were higher again this year with new members joining. Additional money was gathered from members who are not currently walk leaders for the First Aid Training program, and then paid to the Training Provider. Eleven members, current walk leaders, who did the training were paid for by the Club.

Expenses were higher this this year compared to last year - a bit more on administration and website/IT. Our biggest expense continues to be our Insurance and Affiliation, \$4,905.70 paid to Bushwalking NSW.

The Committee recommends no change in membership fees for the coming year. The rate for taking a passenger in your car remains at 14 cents/ kilometre/ person.

The Financial spreadsheets, books and receipts have been audited by Louise Dalton who found them to be in order. I would like to thank Louise for so quickly and thoroughly reviewing the Financial Papers, and generously giving her time.

I would also like to thank all the Committee for their support over the year.

BRINDABELLA BUSHWALKING CLUB SECRETARY'S REPORT 2022-2023

The normal three Committee meetings heldeach year were largely taken up this year with deliberations about the proposed changes to the Club's constitution. It all started with my growing concern about the lack of required Disciplinary and Dispute Settling mechanisms in our existing constitution which changes to the *Associations Incorporations Act 1991* some time previously had made mandatory for all affected associations. We had delayed making any changes while we awaited a revision of the Model Rules governing such changes and these were a long time coming. A small Working Group comprising Peter Dalton, Peter Ford and myself was established to research and consider necessary changes. We had reached the point of going ahead with appropriate changes to incorporate Disciplinary and Dispute Settling procedures into our constitution when, as Murphy's Law would have it, new draft Model Rules were issued by the ACT government. This led to the Working Group deciding on a complete review of our constitution with the resulting proposed changes which the whole Committee then considered in detail. I would like to thank Peter Dalton and Peter Ford for their tireless and invaluable assistance in this project which was beyond one person to carry through and also Prue Deacon and David Wardle for their contributions.

The first meeting of the newly elected Committee took place on 8th November, 2022 where we discussed recent changes to the website and the emerging need for more guidance to leaders about the importance of filing Incident Reports where serious incidents occur on walks. The Committee considered some of the difficulties faced by leaders in organising and conducting trips away with regard to vetting potential participants for their suitability, the mix of walkers with different capabilities, and meeting expectations for accommodation.

The Committee also decided to cease the former practice of the Secretary filtering correspondence from Bushwalking NSW before sending out a link to their News and Events publication to all members with a summary of the main contents. Instead members were encouraged to subscribe as individuals and this was publicised in the BBC Newsletter, and in the letter to new members. The next Walks Program will also carry a reminder about this.

Our second meeting on 1st February, 2023 discussed the need for printed Walks Programs in the future, and a decision was taken to discuss this issue more fully with members at the AGM. We also addressed the proposed changes to the constitution with the focus on disciplinary and dispute resolution procedures and the paragraphs dealing with membership particularly Honorary Life Memberships.

At our third meeting for the year held on 18th July, 2023 we acknowledged the great work being done by our Social Convenor with the number of very successful social events held during the year. We also considered a number of initiatives taken by our very able Webmaster, Peter Dalton including a policy document on Honorary Life Membership Nomination procedures, guides to the Webmaster's tasks, and an alternative method to alert members of walks if there were to be a problem with the Wednesday Walks email system. The need for printed Walks Programs was again discussed and the package of documents to be sent out to members in mid- August (at least 21 days before the AGM) as required when there are constitutional changes. The level of Transport Costs and Subscription Fees to be put to members at the AGM was also discussed as were succession plans for Committee members with a number expressing a wish to step down.

TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT OFFICER'S REPORT 2022-23

Walk Leaders' First Aid Course

Successful completion of a first aid course is not a mandatory requirement for walk leaders, but is strongly recommended.

BBC first aid courses are tailored to contain both the requirements of our club and most of our leaders, with consideration given to:

- a. cost,
- b. bushwalkers specific first aid, and
- c. the practical component must not exceed one day.

The course was open to all BBC members, with walks leaders being funded by the BBC.

The cost per person this year was \$100.

This year's nationally accredited senior First Aid course consisted of an online component followed by a half day practical including a BBC specific bushwalking component.

The course was conducted by Canberra First Aid.

Ten people attended this year's BBC First Aid Course.

The course was conducted much better this year with all BBC required topics covered adequately.

After being approached by NPA's Outing Convener (who had also held discussions with President CBC), next year we shall also invite CBC and NPA members to attend our course if spaces are available. All members attending from other clubs shall need to the pay full amount to our treasurer as the First Aid Provider does not handle individual submissions.

Navigation and Leadership Training

Successful completion of the Navigation and Leadership course is not a mandatory requirement for walk leaders, but is strongly recommended.

Ten people attended the 2023 Navigation and Leadership Training Course.

The BBC has an ageing membership, but we are getting new members who wish to become leaders.

The content of the training comprises a one-day introductory course on daylight terrestrial navigation training (mapcraft, compass, GPS etc) plus the duties and responsibilities of a Walks Leader.

The course was held in a bush setting with participants divided into two groups led respectively by Bill Gibson and Bob Chittenden.

The 2023 Navigation and Leadership Training Course shall be advertised October/November via Email and shall be held on a Tuesday.
